Two Youths Are Hunted

Two 14-year-old Pensacola boys—lost, found and then lost again on a boat trip to Pensacola Bay—were the object at noon today of a search by the Navy, the Escambia Search and Rescue Unit and deputies from Santa Rosa and Escambia counties.

The boat the two had left at the foot of 11th Street in East Pensacola Heights Thursday afternoon was found by a Navy helicopter crew at 10:30 a.m.

The airmen radioed the Navy Search and Rescue headquarters at Sherman Field that the small craft, powered by an outboard engine, was anchored fore and aft a few feet off shore at Avalon Beach, just north of the trestle over Escambia Bay.

Search officials said they had been able to positively identify the boat through its tag number.

They said that they believed the boys had gone ashore and "were perfectly all right."

The two were identified as Larry M. Sapp of 816 E. Berg St. and Reginald D. Bishop, 427-11th St. The boat belonged to the Bishop family.

Relatives reported the youths

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near the Florida Highway Patrol station.

Boats hunted through the night but found no trace of the missing boys and boat. An aerial search was launched shortly after 7 a.m.

At that time, Wallace Phillips, operator of the Seaside Restaurant at Garcon Point, heard a radio newscast telling of the missing pair. Phillips told newsmen that young Sapp and Bishop had arrived at his restaurant in the boat a 6 p.m. Thursday—"cold, wet and scared."

They asked Phillips for gasoline because their supply was running low, the restaurant man said. "He refused them the gas and told them to wait until morning because of the chappy condition of the bay.

Phillips said he gave them the gas early this morning and that the boys left about 6 a.m. to return to Pensacola.

There was no apparent im-

mediate reason as to why young Sapp and Bishop had gone to Avalon Beach instead and had left the boat anchored.

Two Boys On Bay Today

Two 14-year-old Pensacola boys reported missing in Pensacola Bay for more than 12 hours were apparently safe but still in the bay shortly after daylight today.

Larry N. Sapp, of 816 E. Berg St., and Reginald D. Bishop, of 427 11th St., had not been seen since late Thursday afternoon when they left on a boating trip into the bay.

Wallace Phillips, operator of the Seaside Restaurant at Garcon Point, telephoned officials at 7 a.m. this morning that the two boys had spent the night at his place.

He said the pair showed up about 6 p.m. last night and told him they were nearly out of gasoline. Phillips said the two asked for more fuel but he said he refused to give them any last night because he feared the bay was too rough for them to make a return crossing in the dark.

Phillips said he gave them gasoline this morning after putting the two boys up for the night.

He said they left his place at 6 a.m. this morning.

Navy search crews were attempting to locate the boys this morning and were standing by until their return trip was completed.

Phillips said he had no telephone at his restaurant and had

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been unable to call anyone about the boys last night. He said he did not know a search was underway until he heard a radio broadcast.

Phillips, on hearing the newscast, called the radio station and newsman there notified the searchers of the boys whereabouts.

The Escambia Search and Rescue Unit was summoned at midnight last night after the parents became worried about their sons. A search was conducted through the night and the Navy at daybreak sent helicopters to the area.

BANS CUBAN SHIPMENTS
