



More Volunteers Asked For Search

Kendrick Boy Still Missing From Perdido

Emery Kendrick Jr. is still missing.

For the fourth day searchers combed the Perdido Bay area east of Milview in vain for the Escambia High School senior who disappeared Saturday afternoon on a fishing and hunting trip. More than 100 persons searched Tuesday.

Kendrick, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Emory C. Kendrick, 2930 W. Jackson St. and a grandson of former Escambia County Sheriff R. L. Kendrick, was at first presumed to be drowned along with his companion, Joe Morrow, 17, of 2807 W. Jackson St.

Morrow's body was recovered from the bay about four hours after he was seen to fall into the water. Morrow was a crack athlete at Escambia High.

Monday a cap identified as belonging to Morrow was found near Ramsey Beach, south of Sauley field. Several shotgun shells were found nearby. It had first been identified as Kendrick's.

This discovery led searchers to speculate the boys may have been hunting in the swampy area.

Tuesday Army Rangers, Navy personnel and volunteers combed the northeast shore of Perdido Bay. A few more shotgun shells were found.

While about 80 men combed the land in near-freezing weather, skindivers and boatmen searched the bay. Navy helicopters searched from above. No trace of the boy was found.

Search director Pete Morgan of the Sheriff's Department said a maximum effort would be made Wednesday. He called for more boats, grappling hooks, nets, and volunteers to aid in the search.

Morgan said searchers would meet at Smith's Landing on Lillian Highway at 5:30 a.m. Wednesday to map plans for the all-day effort which will begin at sunrise.

The searchers marching through the swampy terrain were frustrated in their efforts to penetrate inland. About 10 horsemen of the Sheriff's Posse searched part of the northeast bank of the bay.

Morgan said about 100 persons searched for Kendrick Tuesday.

The search area is several miles east of where a four-year-old was lost and never found over a year ago.

On June 17, 1959, Danny Barter of Mobile wandered away from his family's picnic site on Perdido Bay. For three weeks more than 1,200 men searched through the swamps. Alligators were cut open in efforts to find possible

Home Damaged

5 Juveniles, 3 Others Are Arrested

Three persons, along with five juvenile boys who come from prominent Pensacola families, were taken into custody Tuesday in connection with a theft and partial destruction at the summer home of Dr. Langley Bell Jr., police said.

Investigators Charlie Williams and Floyd Rose rumbled them up Tuesday after Dr. Bell discovered his waterfront home in Beach Haven had been struck by vandals and a 35-horsepower outboard motor was stolen.

Booked at County Jail were Allen Clayton Perry III, 19, of 308 Sunset Ave., Navy Point; Jesse Marvin Roberts, 17, of 311 Sunset Ave., each charged with grand larceny of the outboard; and John A. Wilson, 23, of 3 Hill Dr., accused of receiving the outboard and selling it for \$100.

The trio is out under \$250 bond each.

Investigator Williams said all admitted participation in the incident.

Williams said the other boys, ranging in age from 11 to 15, will be turned over to juvenile authorities. Law prevents their names being published.

Williams said mattresses were cut and strewn about the cottage. He said pictures and other articles were also thrown about the floor.

2nd Jewelry Job Solved
